

Thought in a Garden Dr. Herbert Kr. Thirku
(Andrew marvell)

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The poem, 'Thought in a Garden' has been composed by Andrew marvell, one of the great metaphysical poets. The poet takes us back to the golden age of innocence and happiness. He suggests that we have lost that age by our own doings. It is our own folly which is responsible for the loss.

The poet is pained to see that people have no time to enjoy the beauty of nature. They struggle hard to win glory in different spheres of life but that labour is of no real significance. They have no mental peace. The poet searched his quiet and innocence in men's company but in vain. At last, he got them in the solitude of a garden. Speaking of the beauty of the garden, he says that there was never a beloved who was more beautiful than a green face.

Those lovers who cut the same of their beloved in the bark of trees are foolish, and he would never do so. He gives a beautiful description of a tropical garden where he finds ripe apples, clusters of vine and mellow peach. Sometimes he finds himself encircled with variety of flowers and falls on grass. In fact, the poet enjoys the beauty of nature and breaks back

the presence of the divine spirit in nature.

The poet wants to become one with nature. He wants to forget all the worries of the world. He identifies himself with various objects of nature. He binds himself ~~to~~ like a bird and singing the joys of nature. He enjoyed the bliss of solitude in the garden of bliss but his happiness was destroyed by Eve's arrival.

The central idea of the poem is the bliss of solitude in the garden. The poet displays his love for trees, fruits and flowers, and senses the scenery and colour. The poem has been described as a symbol of the golden age of man when he lived a happy and innocent life. This poem resembles Keats by its sensuousness and Wordsworth by its optimistic and meditative mood. It has a historical significance. It embodies the love of nature and the quiet life which were developed by Wordsworth. Marvell has used simple expressions like John Keats which makes the poem easily comprehensible.
